


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Risk Is An Essential Element In Children's Development.



It offers physical, social, emotional and intellectual challenges needed for healthy development.





Our U.S. Culture Has Worked Very Hard To Remove Risk From Children's Lives.

We Have Now Created Environments, Policies, & Rules That Are "Too Safe" To Be Safe For Children.

(free range parenting-PS, pencils, out of sight, germs, school pick up)

Many Other Countries Have Done A Much Better Job of Sorting Out Beneficial Risk From Danger.



Their focus is on risks worth taking and their recognizable benefits.


They Know That Risk ...

Teaches children to be comfortable with challenges.

Children innately go only as far as they are comfortable.



Math, reading, venturing a guess, etc.



Risky Activities Are A Natural Part Of Children's Play. It Is Critical That We Support Risky Play.

From a few rules to 100's of rules.

Promulgate pages of rules based on one incident.

See possible danger wherever we look.



In sight, cold days, commercial age appropriate equipment, ignore children's innate Developmental need and ability.

Individual Licensing Staff Have Also Added Their Own Assessment Of What Is Dangerous.

Only play with equipment designed for a given age	No rough and tumble play	No handling of bugs and worms-no dogs	Size of food pieces
No knitting needles	No teacher's pencils or scissors on the desk	All plastic wrappings removed	No going up slides or climbing on top of structures



Child Care Licensing's Purpose...

- To provide protection through prevention;
- By establishing a minimum floor of protection below which children could be seriously harmed or die.



1868, NY Foundlings' Hospital -1 527 infants received in 11 months. All but 80 died in 11 months.




Rules are to be developed to address the minimum floor level and below.

Higher Quality

Minimum Floor of Care

Harm- Serious injury and death



Gun, fire exits, ratios, play surfaces, pools, traffic, etc.

We Need To Distinguish Between

Hazard-

any situation where there is an inherent danger of death or serious injury.



Risk –

any situation where there is a balance between safety and challenge where the children are not in danger of serious injury.

Risk Is A Balance Between Safety And Challenge

The benefits outweigh the risk of minor injury from which children learn quickly.



When Determining Risk Vs Hazard, We Need To Consider the Differences In Children







Children have to experience the natural consequences of their own limitations.

This may mean "little hurts".



"Bandages" are not a sign of a unsafe environment.

(Bandages, brush it off, ice)

Research shows "Risk Awareness" is learned in the early years and lessens as children grow older.

The Assessment of What is Safe and What is Unsafe.

Today, Adults' Actions Threaten This Critical Learning.



When We Create "Too Safe" Environments, We Actual Put Children At Risk....

- Problem solving ability.
- Control over of their own environment.



- Formation of resiliency to face challenges.
- Ability to judge for themselves what is safe and unsafe.

Without Risk Taking, Children and Adults...

- Are reluctant to try
 - new things.
 - Are fearful.
- Have difficulty mastering problems.
 - Can put themselves at greater risk by having a false sense of security.

(bugs, afraid to go out after dark/open windows, jump into a pool, will not drive, leave house, live on own, fearful of new people, can't manage finances, etc.)





Children Need Environments That Remove Hazards, And Not Risk.



- Wood chips
- Helmets and knee pads
- Extra clothing
- Places to throw


